I charge you gentlemen of the jury that in order to overcome the presumption of innocence attending all persons on trial charged with a criminal offense, the evidence must be sufficiently strong to show guilt beyond a reasonable doubt and to a moral certainty, and that in order to show guilt beyond a reasonable doubt in this case, the burden is upon the State to show a felonious intent, to show force by putting in fear as a means of effectuating the intent, and by that means a taking and carrying away the property of another from his person or in his presence.
