Subject, Jim Brown, age 23, was born September 1, 1932. Subject married Helen Ruth Brown of Uriah, Alabama in 1954. He divorced Helen Ruth Brown after living with her a few months.

4. Economic Status: Subject owns no real or personal property.

5. Employment History: Subject worked at Prine's Service Station, Crichton, Mobile, Alabama about one month prior to instant case. Worked at Loper Lumber Company, Bay Minette from September 15, 1955 to November 15, 1955. He was employed as a laborer at the Poling Mill. Prior to that time subject worked for Sherril Jacob Used Car Lot, Bay Minette, Alabama for approximately 1 year. Mack's cafe and Service Station for about two months. Lee's Service Station, Bay Minette, Alabama for three or four months in 1954. Prior to that he worked at Jones Service Station, Atmore three months, in 1954. Prior to that he worked with Clarence Brown, Uriah, sawing poles about two months in 1954. Prior to that he worked at Trailway Service Station, Atmore, Alabama, three months in 1954. Prior to that he worked at Gulf Service Station in Atmore one or two weeks in 1953. Prior to the above mentioned places subject worked at odd jobs.

6. Reputation and Community Attitude: An investigation was made concerning the subject's reputation and behavior. The individuals contacted included persons who have known the subject all of his life, former employers, business firms and public officials. Information obtained revealed that subject with a younger brother left his father's home approximately 6 years ago and came to Bay Minette, Alabama to the home of a Mrs. W. M. Little, to whom subject was known. Subject could give no particular reasons for leaving home other than he did not want to stay longer. Upon Mrs. Little's inability to persuade subject and his brother to return to their father's home she was subsequently able to place them in a home of an elderly couple in Loxley, Alabama where they stayed for a short period of time. Upon returning to Bay Minette, Alabama with his brother, the subject again contacted the said Mrs. Little who persuaded subject's brother to return to his parents home. Subject, Jim Brown, refused to return to his parents home stating that he "would not go home". This seemed to mark the time of subject's waywardness and subsequent altercations with the law. The former employers contacted stated that subject worked well, was cooperative, gave satisfactory service while on the job and had a genial personality. The general reputation of subject for the past 4 to 6 years is that of one who "drinks and picks up anything that he can get his hands on". The opinion of some individuals contacted was that subject should be given a chance on probation to rehabilitate himself; others felt that he would revert to former habits and manner of behavior.

7. Probation Program: In the event the court sees fit to grant the defendant probation he would reside in the home of his cousin, Norman Harwell, Bay Minette, Alabama who would assist him in obtaining employment.

REMARKS: From the course of this investigation this writer must come to the conclusion that subject has been without the benefit of proper parental and Christian influences needed as an incentive to guide him in his formative years. This officer has always been of the opinion that it is better to treat the young offender with the proper probation program than to incarcerate him in an institution where he would acquire the traits of a more hardened criminal. The court should impress upon this individual the necessity of adhering strictly to rules and regulations as set forth by the court and also to advice and counsel given by this office, in the event the court should see fit to place the subject on probation.

Case #2099: The facts of this offense are essentially as follows:

On the night of February 13, 1956, the defendant, with R. O. Hobbs, Jr. and Elmer Maurice O'Neil, accomplices, broke into and entered Wesley's Garage, Stapleton, Alabama and took two automobile tires, one automobile wheel mounted with tire and tube and one radio. On March 16, 1956 a Warrant of Arrest was issued for subject, Jim Brown, who was arrested on the Court House Square, Bay Minette, Alabama, on March 17th, 1956 by Deputy Sheriff Tolbert and placed in the Baldwin County Jail. The defendant, Jim Brown, at arraignment on March 17, 1956 plead not guilty and was bound over to the Grand Jury and bond was fixed at \$2500.00, which he did not make and was committed to jail. On March 26, 1956, the defendant, Jim Brown, withdrew his plea of not guilty and was sentenced to imprisonment in the Penitentiary of Alabama for a period of two years. Subject subsequently applied for benefits of probation and presented a Petition to the Court praying that the court would suspend sentence and grant probation to the defendant, Jim Brown.
