TO THE HONORABLE F. W. HARE, JUDGE OF THE CIRCUIT COURT
OF BALDWIN COUNTY, ALABAMA: IN EQUITY.

Comes HENRY JONES and by this his Bill of Complaint, presented against GLADYS JONES, respectfully shows:


FIRST: That Complainant and Defendant are both over the age of twenty-one years; that he is now and has been all of his life a bona fide resident of Baldwin County as was Defendant until she parted from him as hereinafter stated, since when her present address is unknown, but she is believed to be a non-resident of the State of Alabama.

SECOND: That Complainant and Defendant were married in Mobile on October 11, 1937 and lived together fairly harmoniously up to the month of July 1945, during which time a child was born to them, a daughter now about four years of age.

THIRD: That in July 1945, Complainant discovered his wife in bed with another man and pursuant to this discovery of her adultery, Defendant left the home in which they had been living; as Complainant is informed and believes, with another man, taking with her all of Complainant's money and personal effects and since said abandonment, Complainant has not only not seen Defendant or their child, but is unable to learn of her present whereabouts, other than that she has left the State.

THE PREMISES CONSIDERED, Complainant prays that Gladys Jones be made Defendant in this cause, and that due notice be given her by publication, requiring her to, plead, answer or demur to this cause.

Complainant further prays that upon the hearing of this cause a decree be rendered forever divorcing him from the said Gladys Jones, granting him the custody of the child of the marriage, should it again come within the jurisdiction of this court, granting him the right to marry again should he so desire, and to have such other, further or different relief as to equity may seem meet.

The above named witnesses, appeared before me at the time and place hereinafter stated and upon examination by counsel for Complainant, after being sworn, testified as follows:

HENRY JONES

My name is HENRY JONES and I filed this bill of divorce against Gladys Jones.

We are both over the age of 21 years and have been residents of Baldwin County for the three years next preceeding the filing of this bill.

Gladys Stamps and I were married on the 11th day of October 1937 and lived together as man and wife and had a child.

In July, 1945, I came in about midnight and found her in bed with Henry Ellis. When I came in they both ran and I left her and went off to my mother's house. She came up to my mother's house and my mother heard her talk about this.



Big Attractions Are Needed To Make Huge Stadiums Paying Propositions

Warmer Climates Provide Chance For Usage Almost Year-Round

BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS
NEW YORK.—(AP)—With all the talk of building or enlarging athletic stadiums around the country as soon as materials become available, cities with such projects on the fire might take a look at the financial records of the larger municipal plants now in operation.

A survey conducted by the Associated Press pointed up today at least one lesson to be noted with caution by cities planning to build and run huge structures with taxpayers' funds.

That is, to operate a municipal stadium at a profit you must have the attractions in sufficient quality and quantity to keep the turnstiles clicking.

In the West, where weather conditions are more favorable for outdoor spectacles the year around, the big bowls make money, the survey showed. Those in the East, generally, do not.

Philadelphia's municipal stadium, for instance, was used only eight times during 1946 and brought in a total of \$35,870. The operating cost for the year was \$39,449, leaving a deficit of \$3,579.

of them for the football game on New Year's Day. It seats 86,581, with enough bleachers added on Jan. 1 to bring it to 89,083.

City officials declined to estimate the profits, which revert to the city's general fund, but said they were higher than ever. Football, both high school and junior college, and midweek auto racing are the principal attractions aside from the Rose Bowl game.

Back in the East, Baltimore's municipal stadium was used 101 times in 1946 with a total attendance of 1,246,500 and a net profit of \$7365, but Baltimore's International League baseball club, which moved into the stadium after losing its park in a fire in 1944, contributed heavily to these figures.

Since it was built in 1923 at a cost of \$725,000, the stadium with its seating capacity of 68,000 has lost a total of \$233,123. Its average annual operating expenses are \$13,360 more than average annual receipts. City officials expect it to make money again in 1947, with Baltimore's new entry in the All-America Conference playing seven home games in the stadium.

BREAKS ABOUT EVEN
Chicago's Soldier Field, an \$8,000,000 structure built in 1924, just breaks even from year to year, according to the city's park system which operates it. It seats 100,000 for football and held 104,943 for the second Dempsey-Tunney fight in 1927.

Soldier Field was used 54 times in 1946 and seated a total of 1,350,000 persons, including 1,000,000 for 30 sports events.

Although used only for football, the Cotton Bowl at Dallas always has been a money-maker for the state fair of Texas. Built in 1930 at a cost of \$400,000, it seats 45,507 and drew a total of 245,000 to 15 college and high school football games in 1946.

PEOPLE GOING AHEAD
A remodeling job which would give the Cotton Bowl 10,000 to 20,000 additional seats is in the planning stage.

City Park Stadium in New Orleans, a \$1,000,000 structure with a 26,000 seating capacity, built in 1937, was used 167 times in 1946 and had a total attendance of 220,000. But it loses \$5000 to \$6000 a year, with the City Park Board making up the deficit from other funds.

Balboa Stadium at San Diego, Calif., which seats 30,000, drew 500,000 to 80 major events in 1946. It made a profit for the city in recent years.

Legion Field at Birmingham, Ala., was built in 1927 at a cost of \$375,000 and has 21,000 permanent seats and 3000 temporary seats. Since its construction, \$40,000 has been retired from the original cost, but no interest has been paid and it actually operates at a loss, which the city pays.

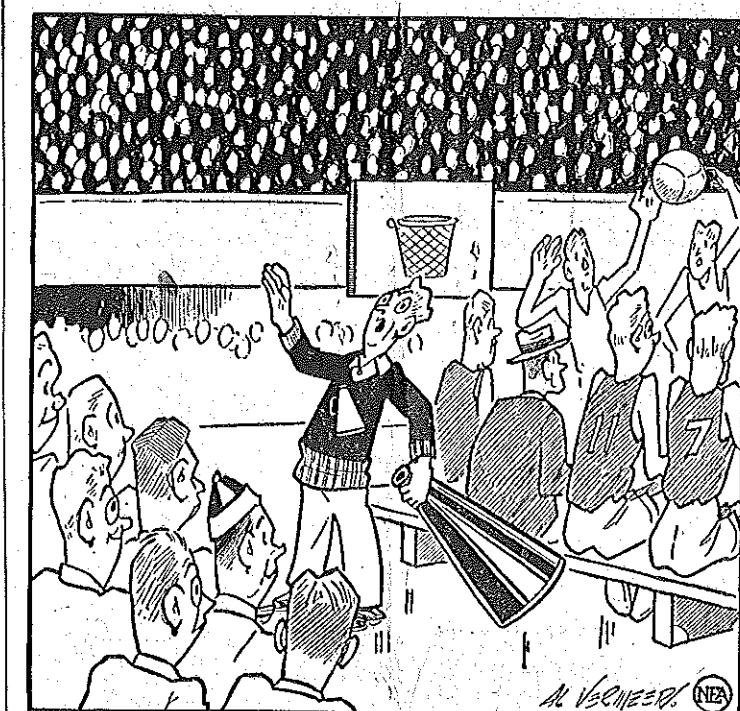
