B. Crosby, Joseph Kenzel, E. G. Strong, John Resmondal, Byard Roberts, B. L. Randall, M. H. Roach, J. A. Holman, Jas M Bishop, Frank Byars, J. W. Richerson, J. A. McKenzie, John Kenzel, B. F. Feist, A. C. Nelson, all of whom answered to their names except Jas M Bishop and John Kenzel, and proof having been made to the satisfaction of the Court that the said Jas M Bishop and John Kenzel have good and sufficient excuse for their non-attendance, It is ordered by the Court that they be put and hereby excused. And the following of said persons so summoned to serve as Grand Jurors were then duly examined as to qualification by the Court, and were then duly and legally empanelled sworn and charged by the Court B. F. Feist having been appointed and sworn by the Court as foreman of said Grand Jury: Henry Lewis, Frank Earle, H. G. Strong, Jack Nym, A. B. Crosby, Joseph Kenzel, E. G.
