That his name is John G. Haupt; that he is Cashier of the State Bank of Elberta, a corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Alabama; that Edward A. Davis is indebted to the State Bank of Elberta in the principal sum of Two Thousand Thirty Seven Dollars and six cents (\$2,037.06) as evidenced by promissory notes and by a chattel mortgage note executed by said Edward A.
