The deposition of MARTIN L. BUSH, a Witness examined on behalf of Plaintiff, in the above entitled cause.

Said witness appeared before me at the time and place hereinafter named, and, after having been first duly sworn to speak the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth, did testify in answer to the interrogatories, as follows:

MARTIN L. BUSH.

To the lst interrogatory, he says:

I am the plaintiff in this case. I know Charles

D. Smith. In September of 1915 he was the engineer and part owner of the "Beaver", a small steamboat running on Mobile Bay
between the City of Mobile and the Village of Daphne in Baldwin
County. This boat was operated by Charles D. Smith and his
brother John Smith.

2nd Int. I had a difficulty with the defendant on September 15th, 1915. This took place at the end of the Bell Rose wharf, which is one of the two wharves at Daphne. It was early in the morning, shortly before the leaving time of the boat. As I remember there were present on the wharf at the time, G. A. Hayes, Jerome Sea, James B. Sea, E. L. Dyas, W. H. Grimes and my little daughter, Mary Bush, also John Smith defendant's brother, and possibly a fireman of the boat and one or two negro deck hands.

3rd. Int. I was on the wharf with my little daughter, waiting for the Steamer "Daphne", on my way to Mobile, when one of the gentlemen from Robertdale, whose names I have

mentioned, came up and asked me which of the boats would get to Mobile first, saying that he was in a hurry. At that time the "Daphne" and the "Beaver" were active competitors. I told him that the "Daphne" would reach Mobile from twenty minutes to half an hour the earlier. One of the employees of the "Beaver" overheard; and evidently went and told Mr. Smith, for he and his brother at once came off the boat, which was lying at the wharf, and came up to where I was sitting, asking me what I meant by telling such a damned lie. I said it was not a lie, as I had gone to Mobile only a few days before on the "Daphne", and she had been tied up at the wharf at Mobile hefore the "Beaver" at least twenty minutes. Mr. Smith again said that this was not so: and when I offered to prove it by someone else, he cursed me and struck me a violent blow in the mouth, knocking me senseless. I know also that he struck my right lower jaw, and my molar tooth was broken, and that he also struck me in the left side, and that he also struck me in the left side, which was very sore and pained me much for about two months. I became senseless after the blow in my mouth; but know that he struck me on the jaw as stated, and on the side, from the marks and soreness of my cheek and side; and the loss of a molar, and from what others told me. When I came to a few minutes later; I was lying on the wharf where I had been sitting,, my little daughter was holding my head and crying. I was sitting when I was struck and did nothing to provoke the assault. There was bad blood between the Smiths and the "Daphne", as the latter was getting most of the business, and Smith struck me because he knew what I told these men would cause them to patronize the "Daphne" rathern than his boat.

4th Int. I did nothing to warrant the assault.

I answered a question that I was askeda by a stranger, and was seated when the blow was struck.

5th Int. I was struck in the mouth and knocked senseless. When I came to, I found two of my front teeth on the

upper jaw broken, and one molar broken offion the right lower Jaw. I had a great deal of pain. I suffered a great deal of pain for a week or ten days. And my lips and jaw were very tender for some time after that: It also caused me a great deal of pain in having the dental work done on my teeth. I also suffered pain in the back of my head and neck; this lasted a month or more. I was confined to my bed four days and suffered most of that time. My head and neck were sore and lame, and it was necessary for my wife to feed me. My side where he struck me was sore for I think my ribs were fractured on that side . I was two months. unable to do any work for a month, and had to hire a man to take my place and paid him about Twenty Dollars to do the same work that I could have done.

6th Int. As I said before, my two front teeth were broken and I had dental work done to them to put them in shape. The molar tooth has not been attended to. My dental work was done by Dr. W. D. Crane of Mobile. He agreed to put my teeth in as good shape as they were prior to the assault for Thirty five (\$35.) Dollars, and has done so except the molar.

7th Int. At the time this happened I was 58 years old, and weighed about 147 pounds. Charles D. Smith at that time weighed about 225 pounds, and was somewhere in the neighborhood of thirty years of age. He was a strong, powerful man. His brother John Smith was also a very large man and weighed nearly 200 pounds: I would not have dared to have had trouble with them. Hohn Smith had a bad reputation at that time for violence.

8th Int. The assault was unprovoked. I had no previous trouble with these people, and no reason to expect any. The defendant at the time of this assault was violent and most profane, apparently because of my answer to the stanrger's question, and took his revenge on me. My daughter was badly frightened at the assault. Marting Bush

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
